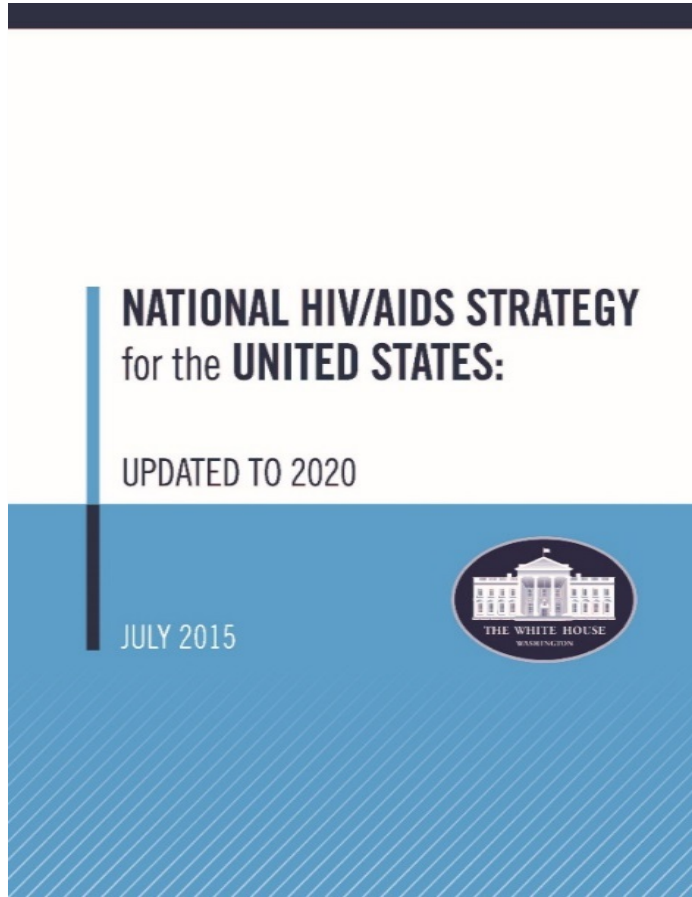

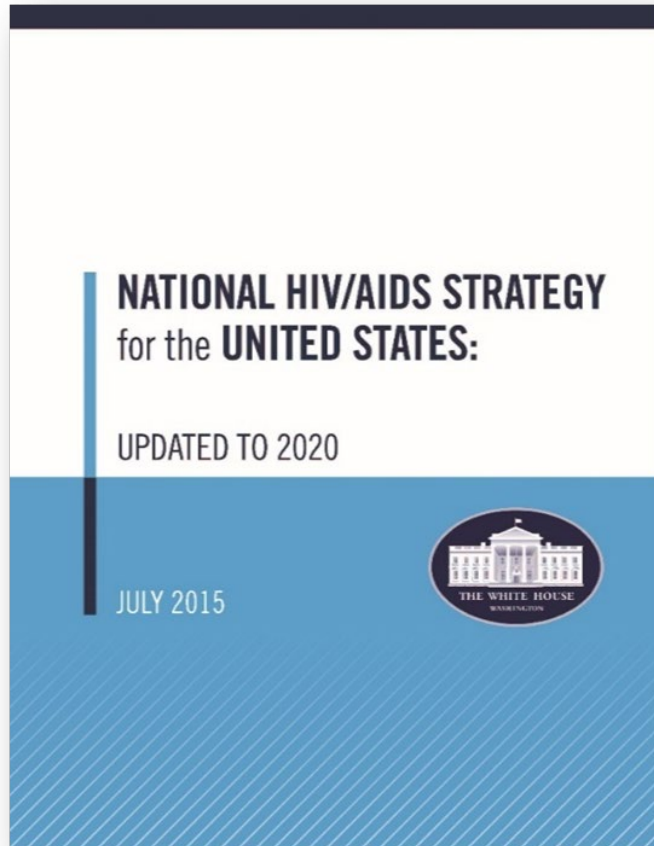

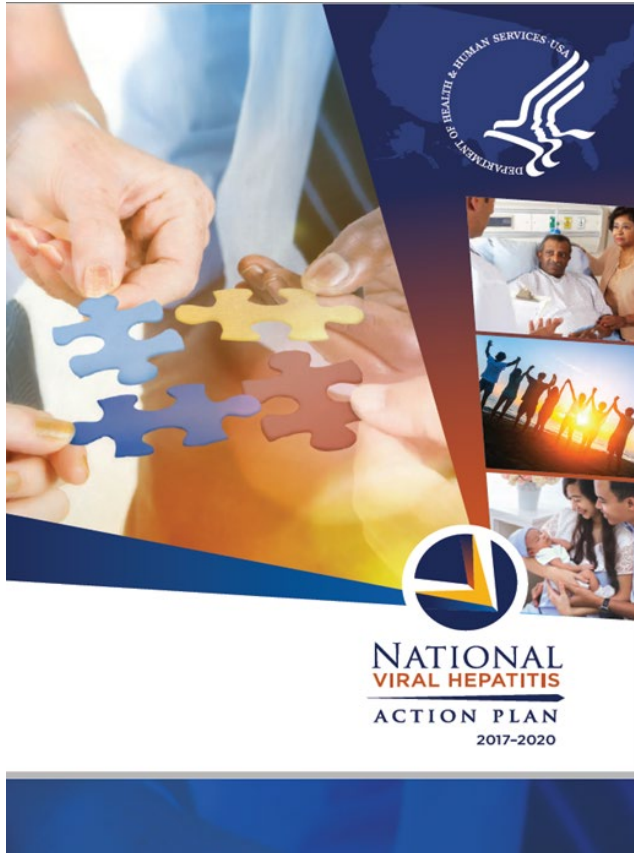
National HIV/AIDS Strategy



- Roadmap for national HIV/AIDS response since it was released in 2010.
- The Strategy was updated in 2015 to reflect the advances in HIV prevention, care, and treatment and build upon the progress achieved.
- 4 national goals:
 - ✓ Reduce new HIV infections
 - ✓ Increase access to care and improve outcomes for people living with HIV
 - ✓ Reduce HIV-related health disparities and health inequities
 - ✓ Achieve a more coordinated national response to the HIV epidemic



National Viral Hepatitis Action Plan



- Released in 2011 in response to the Institute of Medicine’s 2010 report, “*Hepatitis and Liver Cancer*”.
- Updated in 2017 through 2020 with a focus on HBV and HCV.
- 4 national goals:
 - ✓ Prevent New Viral Hepatitis Infections
 - ✓ Reduce Deaths and Improve the Health of People Living with Viral Hepatitis
 - ✓ Reduce Viral Hepatitis Health Disparities
 - ✓ Coordinate, Monitor, and Report on Implementation of Viral Hepatitis Activities



Purpose of Updating the Strategies

- Both national strategies expire in 2020
- Plans will be **two separate and distinct** national strategies
- They will incorporate and respond to:
 - Scientific and clinical advances;
 - New challenges that have emerged (e.g., the opioid crisis);
 - Opportunities for integration; and
 - The need to accelerate progress, conserve resources, and reduce health care costs.



Key Characteristics

- Establish ambitious goals and targets
- Identify the most efficient and effective strategies
- Integrate the latest scientific advances in prevention, care, treatment, and cure
- Leverage existing infrastructure
- Ensure more timely data collection, reporting, and use
- Improve accountability
- Foster engagement from stakeholders at all levels



Engagement: Federal Leadership

- A federal Steering Committee has been formed to set the vision and goals and lead the development of the strategies
- Subcommittees will be convened to develop indicators and identify best practices and strategies for achieving the goals of the strategies
- Existing Federal Implementation Workgroups will staff the subcommittees and provide additional support to the development and implementation of the strategies



Engagement: Nonfederal Stakeholders



- Gathering Input from Federal Advisory Committees
- Convened public listening sessions at national conferences and state/local community planning group meetings
- Provided opportunity to comment by webinar
- Published a Request for Information in the Federal Register



Timeline for Developing the National Strategies

Fall 2018 – Winter 2019

- Launch efforts with federal partners
- Partner Engagement

Spring 2019 – Winter 2019

- Analyze public comments
- Review latest science and data
- Draft and finalize strategies
- Develop dissemination and communications plans

Spring/Summer 2020

- Publish next iteration of strategies
- Disseminate strategies

Summer 2020

- Develop Implementation Plans



Federal Action Plan for STDs Now Under Development!

- STDs – sharp increase in recent years
- OHAIDP, in coordination with federal partners, will lead development of a national plan
 - A federal steering committee has been formed to set the vision, goals, and lead development
- Opportunities for public input – today, National HIV Prevention Conference (March 21) and others to be announced
- Anticipated release in 2020
